

Breakout Group - Handout 3

You are having lunch with some friends and the conversation turns to the Bible. One friend, who claims to be a Christian, says that he believes God spoke to the prophets and writers of Scripture and inspired them with thoughts, but that they didn't always record them perfectly.
